Don't keep your book drive a secret!

Send a press release to spread the word

Sending a press release is a great way to let your community know about your book drive. It can lead to donations of books and money. If you are a child or teen, it's a great idea to have an adult review your press release before you send it. And if you are adult it is a good idea too!

Press releases follow a standard—and easy—format. And the best ones are four or five short paragraphs, with short, clear sentences. You will find a sample below.

What to include

- 1. At the top of your release, write FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE
- 2. Provide contact information in case the reporter wants additional information or an interview. Include the name, email and day time phone for an adult or parent of one of the book drive organizers. If you created your own page on the ALP website, also include that link here.
- 3. Write a headline that will grab attention
- 4. The first paragraph should begin with the city and state where the book drive will take place and the date of the release.
- 5. In the first paragraph answer the questions—who, what, where, when, why and how.
- 6. In the second paragraph use a quote from someone involved in the book drive, explaining why he/she is volunteering to collect books.
- 7. The third paragraph should contain information about the African Library Project. Feel free to use the paragraph in the sample.
- 8. The last paragraph should give more details about how people can help
- 9. Add a "tag" about ALP and about your organization. If you have a website, add that web address.

What you should do

- 1. Write your press release draft
- 2. After someone reviews your draft, send it in an email with no attachments to contacts from your local newspaper(s), radio station(s), and TV stations. You can find contact emails on the websites for your local press resources. The email subject line should be brief and descriptive. Include the name of your town or city in the subject line, so the reporters know it is a local story; for example, Mayfield Scouts Start Library in Ghana
- 3. It's a good idea to call your local paper or tv station the day before any good photo opportunities. If you are having a fundraiser, a book-packing party, or taking all the boxes to the post office, let the media know.
- 4. If you get local press, let ALP know!

Scouts Start Library in Ghana: Mayfield Youth Send Beloved Books around the World

"I love to read and I go to the library all the time," says 15-year-old Victor Castrejon, one of the Scouts organizing the book drive. "I was sad to hear that kids in Ghana don't have many books. I'm excited to be part of starting a library at a school that doesn't have one."

The African Library Project has mobilized volunteers from across the United States to start 1,825 libraries in 11 countries over the past 10 years. A volunteer-based organization headquartered in Berkeley, CA, ALP helps Americans work with African partners to create libraries in communities with little or no access to books. "We couldn't do it without the dedication and creativity of book drive organizers," says Chris Bradshaw, founder of the African Library Project.

The troop is requesting donations of paperback books in English at a 4th-8th grade reading level. Books can be dropped off at [address].
